PRESIDENT'S SKI TRACKS

It's mid-December, and still the snow on

Hood is scant. The forecast for the mountain looks hopeful for the next week: chance of snow or snow likely, but we keep our fingers crossed because we know how fickle PNW weather is, compounded by the unknowns of global warming.

In spite of the thin snow pack, fifteen optimistic members of ONC/PDX attended the Leadership Training on December 14 with Shelley Hakanson of Wy'East Nordic and her capable assistant, Ann Borland, from Eugene Parks and Recreation (see photos on page 6). We started out on the Trillium airstrip and worked on the fine points of the diagonal stride. Shelley and Ann reminded us to assume the gorilla stance, flex our ankles, and place our poles no farther ahead than our boots and taught us how to be aware of and helpful to beginning skiers. We did warm-up exercises and played tag as a tricky way to introduce novices to the step turn. In the afternoon, we found patches of snow at Summit Ski Area and worked on downhill skills: step turns, wedge turns, and the braking wedge turn. We sharpened our own skiing and practiced helping beginning skiers have more fun on a ski tour by identifying and solving common skiing problems. For most of us, it was the first day out on the snow for the season. Even though we had to dodge protruding rocks and bushes, the air was fresh, the training was successful, the company was excellent, and the magic of snow, mountains, and skiing was definitely alive.

The board of ONC-PDX is continually thinking about ways to improve the club — like offering annual Leadership Training. We're mulling over other ideas as well and want to hear from you about ways to better serve the club members. We're planning to send out an electronic survey through

Survey Monkey in January. We promise it will be limited to five questions. We want to know what you value and want to see happen in the club. How can we remain a viable club? How can we attract younger members? How can we better promote crosscountry skiing in spite of the deluge of snowshoers?

As you know, ONC-PDX is part of a state-wide organization with nine different chapters. Klamath Basin Ski Club recently joined as did the Pine ent projects are underway in each club. Pine Valley is teaming with the Halfway school to offer Nordic skiing to 81 students as part of their P.E. curriculum; the club is grooming trails near the school for the students' use. Central Oregon Nordic Club is raising money for a new shelter at Swampy Lakes ski area outside Bend. Southern Oregon Nordic Club is also grooming trails as well as sponsoring the John Day race at Diamond Lake on February 16th. The Willamette chapter has stocked wood at the shelters at Maxwell Butte and the Ray Benson snow parks on Santiam Pass. The Blue Mountain Nordic Club is working with the Umatilla Forest Service to maintain 18 miles of groomed trails at Meacham Divide off of I-84. DAY TOUR POLICIES

Tours depart promptly, arrive at least 10 minutes before the scheduled departure time to allow for necessary arrangements. Arrive fully prepared for the day's activities!

Trips are not canceled unless the weather and road conditions are unsafe; contact the leader when conditions are dangerous. Tour leaders may change tour itinerary, due to weather conditions. Bring the Tour Essentials (see list on the side bar, page 6), food, water, map, clothing, and equipment appropriate for the tour.

Tour leaders can forbid you from joining a tour, if you are not prepared. Read and heed the Oregon Nordic Club's Tour Ratings listed below.

Day tour participants are encouraged to car pool and share costs. The suggested contribution by each passenger is 15 cents per mile. For three or more passengers, the maximum total contribution by all passengers is limited to 45 cents per mile.

Dogs are only allowed on "Dog Tours." These trips are designated with: "See website for dog policy for skitours.

Dogs must be on a leash in sno-parks. Please keep dogs off ski tracks and pack out dog waste.

TOUR RATINGS

These designations are a guide to the skill and commitment level required for each tour. A full trip rating always includes a terrain rating plus a

Hood River Ranger District visitor facility

Winter hours of the newly remodeled Hood River Ranger District visitor facility, located at 6780 Highway 35 near Parkdale, Oregon, are Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m. New latrine facility is available the same hours. Gifford Pinchot National Forest

Wind River snowplowing plans According to the Gifford Pinchot NF website, "Skamania County will be plowing the Wind River Highway (Forest Road 30) to Lone Butte Sno-Park to provide winter recreation access north of Carson, WA. This will provide access to Koshko Sno-Park, Lone Butte Sno-Park, McClellan Meadows Sno-Park and Old Man Pass Sledding Area (not Old Man Pass Sno-Park). Skamania County will plow as long as funding allows; at which time plowing will stop at the Wind River fish hatchery.

Curly Creek Road will not be plowed. Information on plowing in Skamania County can also be found at the county website http://www.skamaniacounty.org/public-works/homepage/upper-wind-river-recreation-area/."

Deschutes National Forest

The Meissner Sno-Park (from Bend, the closest network of crosscountry ski trails along Century Drive) has recently undergone dramatic changes. This land of concentrated lycra and fitness fanatics now has a supersized parking lot and a second restroom; a warming shelter is also planned for next year. According to the Forest Service website, improvements are being funded through grants from the Federal Highways Administration and the Oregon State Parks and Recreation, as well as contributions from Bend's Meissner Nordic Club.

Swampy Lake Shelter The sorrowful and decrepit winter shelter on the north side of Swamp Lakes will continue to limp along. The Forest Service has not offered funds for constructing a new shelter, and any relocation may ensuare the effort in a more complex and costly environmental analysis. The agency is encouraging the Central Oregon Nordic Club to submit grant proposals.

- Skis, poles and boots. To help everyone spend more time on the trail, rent your equipment the day before.
- Warm clothing made of man-made materials or wool blends—no cotton!
- Hat, gloves/mittens and socks. Again, no cotton, and bring extras—you'll use them.
- Rainjacket and rainpants

- Gaiters if you have them.
- Lunch and snacks
- Plenty of liquid (at least one liter). A thermos with something hot to drink is nice to have.
- Sunscreen and sunglasses.
- Pack cover—if you don't have a pack cover, line your pack with a plastic garbage bag to keep things dry.

Pine Valley Club The club was organized to teach Nordic skiing to the students of the local school and in general to promote Nordic skiing in the area. They received a used snowmobile and locals are making grooming equipment. The school grounds and some private land will be groomed.

Klamath Basin Ski Club They have a website that a member designed which has a social networking side.

Blue Mountain Nordic Club They are working on agreements to maintain Nordic trails at Meacham Divide and in the Umatilla National Forest.

Ochoco Nordic They hope to have other chapters who will be traveling to the area join them for tours. **Columbia Gorge Chapter** They manage the Tilly Jane Guard Station and supplied it with wood. They will be helping to teach students from the Washington School for the Blind which they have been doing for seven years. The are looking into selling ONC zip T-shirts which would be available for all ONC members.

mileage rating, to help you better select the right tour for your ability and inclination. Please consider your physical conditioning and your equipment when deciding to go on a tour. Match the tour level to your ability for your physical safety and comfort, and the safety and comfort of other participants on the tour. If you are in any doubt about the rating of a tour, please call the tour leader before the day of the tour.

Novice Ski Tour These tours are for the inexperienced skiers. While this is not a lesson, the leader will help new skiers as much as possible. Tour length is 3 – 5 miles over

Easy Tour Ski: 4–6 miles over gentle terrain at a pace comfortable for all participants.

nearly flat terrain.

Bike: Mostly flat terrain, 8–10 m.p.h. pace, frequent regrouping.

Hike: < 8 miles; 200 ft. per mile elevation gain. Backpack: <5 miles/ day; 200 ft. per mile elevation gain.

Intermediate Tour

Ski: 6-12 miles. Terrain flat to long hills that are no steeper than found on a road (maximum 10 degrees). Moderate pace. Trail turning skills required, if there are hills. Consult tour description for specifics.

Bike: Moderate terrain with rolling hill (some short steep hills); 10–14 m.p.h. pace, regrouping when appropriate.

Hike: 8-10 miles; 200 to 400 ft. per mile elev. gain. **Backpack:** 5-7 miles per day; 200 to 400 ft. per mile elevation gain.

Advanced Tour Ski: > 12 miles. Terrain flat to steep hills (> 10 degrees). Moderate to fast pace. Strong turning skills required on the tours with

Bike: Difficult terrain with one or more major hills/ series of longer, steeper hills; 15–18 m.p.h. pace, regrouping when necessary.

steeper slopes.

Hike: > 10 miles; 400 ft. per mile elevation gain. Steady pace and/or difficult terrain (a workout).

Backpack: > 7 miles/ day; 400 – 600 ft./mile elevation gain.

TOUR ESSENTIALS

Pack these essentials on any ONC activity, "just in case." Remember that cotton offers no insulation when wet. Choose wool or synthetics like polypro or Capilene® for warmth and comfort.

Skiing & Hiking Essentials

- First aid kit
- Matches (in waterproof case) and fire starter
- Rain gear and extra clothes, including a warm sweater
- Extra food and water
- Plastic whistle
- Map and compass (know how to use)
- Flashlight, extra batteries and bulb
- Space blanket or bivy bag
- Pocket knife
- Toilet paper and trowel (ziplock bag to carry out toilet paper)



Reports

President: Ann provided a report of the ONC State Board meeting based on minutes from the meeting. The minutes will be forwarded to other Board members. 
