PRESIDENT'S SKI TRACKS

From newcomer to board member

I am a relative newcomer to Nordic skiing (and Oregon), having only been seriously introduced to the sport in January 2011. The sunnier and drier climate of Northern California and graduate school left little time for pursuing something that had always fascinated me; cross country skiing. My first winter here was relatively unmemorable and I spent most of my time adapting to cycling in Portland winters. I bought some rain gear, learned to dress in layers, installed fenders on my bicycle and peddled through many puddles during the winter of 2010. The legion of year round cyclists greeted me with gritty smiles and soggy salutes as we passed one another in our daily treks through the city.

The novelty of riding in cold, wet weather began to wear thin by the Winter of 2011, I still remember clearly the day I had my mountain/skiing epiphany. As one peddles east on the Springwater Corridor Trail there are several points where Mount Hood suddenly looms over the skyline. It was 38 degrees outside and although the rain momentarily stopped, water still trickled off my visor and down the side of my face. The grey sky started to turn into a blue one, and Wy'East, covered in white, luminous snow seemed to be only a few pedal strokes away. I stopped to take in the vista, and vowed to find a way to get up there and learn to ski the Nordic way. Exploring Mount Hood is easier, faster and less expensive than trying to travel to Lake Tahoe in California, Portland Parks and Recreation had a winter activity program, which included an introduction to cross country skiing class. I signed up for a session and made my way over to Next Adventure to find a few things I would need. While there, I found a flyer for the Bergfruende Ski Club offering a four week cross country ski workshop and registered for that as well. The instant I strapped on my skis and tentatively moved across the snow, I was hooked. I

wanted to ski more, and knew that the only way to improve both skills and stamina was through skiing as much as possible. I carpooled with others to get to the mountain but also chugged up the highway on then functioning *Greasebus*, sadly no longer running, and the Mt Hood Meadows ski bus.

A fellow Bergie suggested I join the Nordic Club which I did. I took advantage of the many novice and beginner day trips offered by, Louise Brown, Kathy Burns, Sam Digard and others. The Wednesday ski group with Mary or Terry was another alternative. On every adventure I experienced camaraderie and helpful, encouraging advice from leaders and my fellow skiers. Weekend trips soon led to overnight trips including Central Oregon, Anthony Lakes in the Eastern part of the state, and Mount Rainier in Washington. The to do list only seems to grow longer, Methow Valley, Glacier National Park, Canmore in Alberta and so many other places. Many of these are some of the ONC's favorite overnight destinations and I look forward to participating in more of our multiday tours.

Four years of Nordic skiing altered my perspective when it comes to the seasons as experienced here in the Pacific Northwest. I love the spring and summer. Cycling on cool, spring mornings or meandering along the Willamette on those rare warm, summer evenings are fond memories and I look forward to them every year. Come late September, however, as the days shorten and grow crisp, and my bicycle skims (and sometimes skids) over the yellow, orange and gold leaves of autumn I find myself looking at the horizon toward Wy'East. awaiting the return of the mountain's first snowfall. Until then, however, let us all enjoy the magnificence that surrounds us, whether in a kayak, canoe or sailboat, on a hike or our friendly two wheeled steeds. Better yet, this summer, offer to lead an ONC day tour of one of your favorite non-skiing activities.

DAY TOUR POLICIES

Tours depart promptly, arrive at least 10 minutes before the scheduled departure time to allow for necessary arrangements. Arrive fully prepared for the day's activities!

Trips are not canceled unless the weather and road conditions are unsafe; contact the leader when conditions are dangerous. Tour leaders may change tour itinerary, due to weather conditions.

Bring the Tour Essentials (see list on the side bar, page 6), food, water, map, clothing, and equipment appropriate for the tour.

Tour leaders can forbid you from joining a tour, if you are not prepared. Read and heed the Oregon Nordic Club's Tour Ratings listed below.

Day tour participants are encouraged to car pool and share costs. The suggested contribution by each passenger is 15 cents per mile. For three or more passengers, the maximum total contribution by all passengers is limited to 45 cents per mile.

Dogs are only allowed on "Dog Tours." These trips are designated with: ""
See website for dog policy for ski tours.

Dogs must be on a leash in sno-parks. Please keep dogs off ski tracks and pack out dog waste.

TOUR RATINGS

These designations are a guide to the skill and commitment level required for each tour. A full trip rating always includes a terrain rating plus a

the result. Some issues discussed include improving recreational access (boating, hiking, biking), trails and their connections to existing trails. Public transit was also brought up, like the one currently being tested on the Washington side of the Gorge, the WET bus. Their next steps will be to continue with revisions to the proposals, appraise the budget and phasing for the projects, develop management strategies and move ahead with cultivating partnerships with neighboring agencies and interested parties. Gifford Pinchot National Forest Swift Creek Bridge repair delayed The Swift

Creek Bridge, at milepost 4.2 about seven miles east of Cougar, WA on Forest Road 90 (Lewis River Road), was due to be repaired and Forest Road 90 closed for a couple of weeks, but it has been postponed. No new date for the repair has been scheduled.

Climbers Bivouac on Mt. St. Helens open The

Road to the Climber Bivouac, which accesses the Monitor Ridge climbing route, opened on May 29. **Mt. Margaret permits** Permits to hike and backpack in the Mt. Margaret area are available online: www.recreation.gov. Most trailheads require a Northwest Forest Pass. Info: 360 449-7800.

Loowit Trail #26 conditions Loowit Trail is mostly snow covered on the south side of Mt. St. Helens at 4,500 ft. especially under trees. Trail junctions with Ptarmigan Trail, Butte Camp Trail and Sheep Canyon trails are covered with snow. Crossing gullies will require extra caution. Forest Road 99 is closed. All according to the May 29Forest Service posting.

Deschutes National Forest Proposed Nordic Traverse and Backcountry

Huts Three Sisters Backcountry, which has yurts in the Central Oregon, may add more. They have been working on a Nordic Traverse along the Metolius-Windigo Trail from Mt. mileage rating, to help you better select the right tour for your ability and inclination. Please consider your physical conditioning and your equipment when deciding to go on a tour. Match the tour level to your ability for your physical safety and comfort, and the safety and comfort of other participants on the tour. If you are in any doubt about the rating of a tour, please call the tour leader before the day of the tour.

Novice Ski Tour

These tours are for the inexperienced skiers. While this is not a lesson, the leader will help new skiers as much as possible. Tour length is 3 – 5 miles over nearly flat terrain.

Easy Tour

Ski: 4–6 miles over gentle terrain at a pace comfortable for all participants.

Bike: Mostly flat terrain, 8–10 m.p.h. pace, frequent regrouping.

Hike: < 8 miles; 200 ft. per mile elevation gain.

Backpack: < 5 miles/day; 200 ft. per mile

elevation gain. Intermediate

Tour

Ski: 6-12 miles. Terrain flat to long hills that are no steeper than found on a road (maximum 10 degrees). Moderate pace. Trail turning skills required, if there are hills. Consult tour description for specifics.

Bike: Moderate terrain with rolling hill (some short steep hills); 10–14 m.p.h. pace, regrouping when appropriate.

Hike: 8-10 miles; 200 to 400 ft. per mile elev. gain. **Backpack:** 5-7 miles per day; 200 to 400 ft. per mile elevation gain.

Advanced Tour

Ski: > 12 miles. Terrain flat to steep hills (> 10 degrees). Moderate to fast pace. Strong turning skills required on the tours with steeper slopes.

Bike: Difficult terrain with one or more major hills/ series of longer, steeper hills; 15–18 m.p.h. pace, regrouping when necessary.

Hike: > 10 miles; 400 ft. per mile elevation gain. Steady pace and/or difficult terrain (a workout).

Backpack: > 7 miles/ day; 400-600 ft./mile elevation gain.

TOUR ESSENTIALS

Pack these essentials on any ONC activity, "just in case." Remember that cotton offers no insulation when wet. Choose wool or synthetics like polypro or Capilene® for warmth and comfort.

Skiing & Hiking Essentials

- First aid kit
- Matches (in waterproof case) and fire starter
- Rain gear and extra clothes, including a warm sweater
- Extra food and water
- Plastic whistle
- Map and compass (know how to use)
- Flashlight, extra batteries and bulb
- Space blanket or bivy bag
- Pocket knife
- Toilet paper and trowel (ziplock bag to carry out toilet paper)
- Sunglasses, lip balm and sun screen
- Foam sit pad

Biking Essentials

- Helmet (required on all bike rides)
- Spare tube
- Patch kit
- Tire pump
- Water bottle (filled)
- Tire irons

Join a Trail Tending Party this summer

It's time to set aside a day for a work party to improve our ski trails for the coming

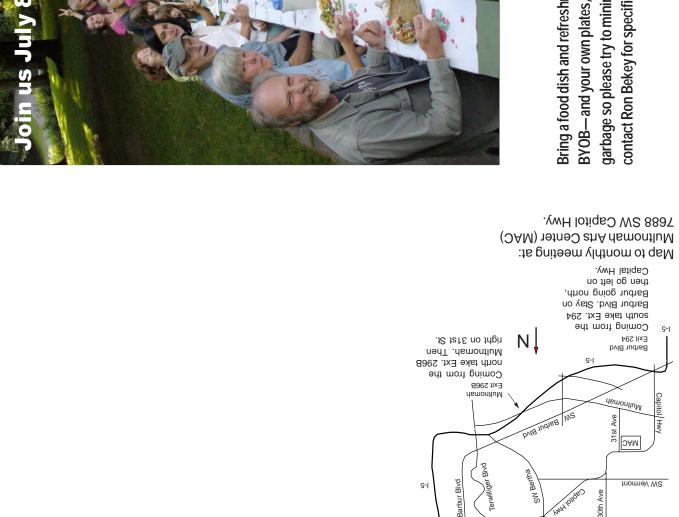
