On October 15 our gallant group of six skiers departed early to drive over to Walton

Lake outside of Prineville to do trail tending on some neglected ski trails. After checking in with the Forest Service and adding two to our ranks from Bend and Prineville we headed to the moun-





tains. We dropped off overnight gear at the cabin, got down to business at about 11 a.m. just above Walton Lake, and worked our way along the trails adding diamonds cutting out small trees and limbs. It was fantastic fall day, sunny and in the sixties in the afternoon. We saw a herd of wild horses and several mule deer. ### Recently I attended a volunteer apprecia-

tion dinner put on by the Ochoco Forest Service to recognize all 539 people who did volunteer work in that district—a fantastic number of volunteers! It got me thinking how lucky ONC-PDX is to have some really outstanding people who volunteer to help the club, and when needed, for projects such as trail tending, Tilly Jane restoration, and the wood haul. At our November general meeting we recognized 74 individuals for helping out ONC-PDX with their time and effort, many of the volunteers recognized for many days of service. Since we are a small club that means 30 percent of our members are stepping forward to help out. Which, I think, is outstanding record!

#### DAY TOUR OVERVIEW RSVP

It's important that our organizer's time and effort in planning events is respected and appreciated. Respecting your RSVP also ensures that all of our members have access to our tours that may otherwise fill up. We document no shows for events and this will impact your acceptance for future events.

#### **Tour Difficulty**

It is always difficult to communicate the difficulty of a tour. (See page 5 sidebar for ratings.) These rating are a starting point. If you are uncertain then we strongly encourage you to contact the tour lead (it is much easier to sort this out before the trip than on the trail).

#### What to Bring

Let's start with the 10 Essentials. This is list of items which we recommend every participant carry (not just the tour leader). For clothing please look at: onc-pdx.org/resources/ wear/ For the vast majority of our tours you need to have skis beforehand (we don't have time to stop and rent skis on the way). If you need to rent equipment please see Rentals and Retailers.

#### Carpooling

Lack of snow worthy vehicles is a growing issue for the club and board is reviewing options to change our policy. The ONC-PDX carpool policy is: Each passenger contributes 15 cents per mile. For three or more passengers, the maximum total contribution by all passengers is limited to 45 cents per mile. Typical carpool cost per

## Mt. Hood NF New Mirror Lake Trailhead The Mirror

Lake Trailhead officially opened on Friday, November 9 with a ribbon cutting ceremony. The improvements offer a safer and accessible access to the trail. There is new a trailhead plaza area with an expanded parking lot, architectural finishes, and public facilities. There will no longer be the need to park along U.S. 26 and backup into on-coming traffic. Great coordination between state and federal agencies and local communities made this accomplishment possible. Info: flh.fhwa.dot.gov/projects/or/mirror-lake

### **Gifford Pinchot NF Gifford Pinchot Winter Partnership** Meeting Nov. 27, 2018

**Skamania County Roads** The Oldman Pass and Mineral Springs roads will be plowed once each day when the snow depth is over four inches. The road from Old Man pass down Curley Creek to the N-90 will be plowed this season for safety concerns. The MSH Trac Riders and the Forest Service spent one day cutting trees along the road so a plow could get thru (57 people).

**Northwest Snow Grooming** Old Man Pass will have a dedicated grooming machine this year, to avoid transport of the groomer, since they use a different machine for ski trails verses snow mobile trails. Once enough snow falls they plan on weekly grooming of the ski trails. The same holds true for the South side of Mt. Adams trails. The ski trails at Peterson Prairie the Forest Service will try grooming those trails with a tow groomer behind a snowmobile. The Forest Service might want trail tending next year, if they continue this grooming.

**GPS trackers** The Washington State Parks has installed and updated GPS trackers on all the grooming machines and will have available real time grooming reports on the website for the whole state.

**Mt. Adams to Lone Pine** will get groomed on Wednesday and Thursdays

**Snowking and Pineside Sno-Parks** will get groomed on fridays. If you have an emergency and see a trail-grooming machine in operation the operator does carry a satellite phone and can call for help. Marble Mt. Sno-Park trails will get groomed on Wednesdays. A winter timber harvest is in operation below Flat Top Sno-Park, watch for log trucks! Mt. Saint Helens Monument The warming hut at Marble Mountain will open December 1. The ski trail grooming did not work last year due to tight trail turns. The Forest Service might want help in 2019 to widen the trails for a groomer. So ski trail grooming may or might not happen depending equipment working on these trails? Update will come later.

**Trout Lake Cabin Fever Festival** The festival will occur on the first weekend in February.

**Washington Sno-Park passes** for skiers are \$40 per season. A higher price pass is required on some trail systems in Northern Washington State Parks that groom for skating skiing. The Troopers checking sno-parks will issue first time warning tickets, which can be cleared by purchasing a snopark pass. Last year at Marble Mt. Sno-Park they issued 40-90 warnings per day on weekends. If you don't pay the warning ticket and buy the sno-park pass, you can get a \$100 fine.

**Groomer Rides** If you want an interesting winter day, contact the Washington State Parks and you can ride for free on a snow groomer for a whole day as a volunteer. The trip may last for 8 to 10 hours! Ken Wenzel, *President* Pam Rigor, *Editor*

#### FS Dog Policy

Dogs must be on a leash in all sno-parks (Forest Service regulation). Please keep dogs off ski tracks and pack out dog waste.

### TOUR/TRIP RATINGS

All ONC-PDX tours/trips are rated as either Novice, Easy, Intermediate, or Advanced. These terms are an approximate guide to the skill and commitment required for the tour/ trip. Use the rating quide to select the right tour/trip for your ability and inclination. Please do not attempt a tour/ trip that is beyond your ability; you could endanger yourself or others in your party.

#### Novice Ski

2–5 miles slow-paced day tours over gentle terrain. These tours are for beginning crosscountry skiers with a little prior skiing experience (the ability to do a reasonable shuffle on skis). Leaders will not teach skiers how to ski, but will help them as much as possible.

## Easy

Ski: 4-6 miles over gentle terrain at a pace comfortable for all participants. Bike: Mostly flat terrain, 8-10 m.p.h.

terrain, 8–10 m.p.h. pace, frequent regrouping.

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cont. from sidebar page 5 **Hike:** < 8 miles; 200 ft. per mile elevation gain. **Backpack:** < 5 miles/day; 200 ft. per mile elevation gain.

Intermediate Ski: 6-12 miles. Terrain flat to long hills that are no steeper than found on a road (maximum 10 degrees). Moderate pace. Trail turning skills required, if there are hills. Consult tour/trip description for specifics.

**Bike:** Moderate terrain with rolling hill (some short steep hills); 10– 14 m.p.h. pace, regrouping when appropriate. **Hike:** 8–10 miles; 200

to 400 ft. per mile elev. gain.

**Backpack:** 5–7 miles per day; 200 to 400 ft. per mile elevation gain.

**Advanced Tour** Ski: > 12 miles; terrain flat to steep hills (> 10 degrees); moderate to fast pace.; strong turning skills required on the tours with steeper slopes. Bike: Difficult terrain with one or more major hills/series of longer, steeper hills; 15-18 m.p.h. pace, regrouping when necessary. Hike: > 10 miles; 400 ft. per mile elevation gain; steady pace and/ or difficult terrain (a workout).

Backpack: > 7 miles/day; 400-600 ft./ mile elevation gain. TOUR

Overnight trip signups are done online at the club website: oncpdx.org/activities then click on "Overnight Trips." The website will begin accepting applications on a day and at a time specified by the ONC-PDX Board of Directors, with registration usually occurring during the week following the October general meeting. Once accepted, the trip applicants will receive a confirmation email. To complete the sign-up process, the member

If a trip appears to be full during the registration process, applicants should contact the trip leader directly to: (i) confirm that the trip is actually full; and (ii) if full, to be placed on the trip wait list as cancellations are relatively common.

4. Trip leaders have the authority to not accept a trip participant application if the applicant does not appear to have the appropriate level of skiing ability for the trip; or (ii) bed availability does not match the a participant's circumstances, e.g., the applicant will be traveling alone, does not want to share a bed, and only one double bed remains available, which is better suited for another couple that has applied for the trip. 5. Trip leaders, after consulting with the ONC-PDX Board and **Overnight Trip** Committee (OTC), may also deny a trip application based on an applicant's behavior on previous ONC-PDX trips.

Wait list procedures 1. To be placed on a trip wait list, applicants must submit a completed trip application to the designated trip leader, along with a check for the full amount of the trip fee. If space becomes available, wait list participants may then choose to fill the space or decline.

If a wait list exists, the trip leader will determine whether wait-listed applicants can be reasonably substituted for the cancelling participant(s). If a wait list does not exist, and sufficient time is available, the trip leader will advertise the trip availability through reasonable means available to the trip leader, typically through the web forum and club newsletter. 4. If the leader is able to make a reasonable substitution for the cancelling participant, the cancelling participant will receive a refund of amounts paid, minus: (i) \$10 for each participant associated with the cancellation; and (ii) 3% of the amount paid. All communications regarding trip cancellations and associated refund requests are to be directed to the trip leader, who will coordinate with other club members, as
